Yachats has the following non-partisan Council positions open to be filled in the November 6, 2018 elections:

Mayor: two-year term ending December 31, 2020

Two Councilors – four-year terms ending December 31, 2022

Qualifications for Elective Office

Candidates must be registered voters at the time of election and reside in the City during the 12

months immediately preceding the election. The State of Oregon publishes the Candidate Manual that serves as a guide and provides the necessary forms at <http://sos.oregon.gov/elections/Pages/Manuals-tutorials.aspx>. A filing packet may also be picked up at City Hall. The entire filing process must be completed by the State filing deadline of August 30, 2018. However, to ensure that all signatures are verified and the petitions and other documents have been completed by that date, the City Elections Officer has established a filing deadline for the petitions of **4:30 pm on August 22, 2018** to City Hall.

Facilities Manager Report

Northwest Roofing has begun to replace the roof on the Commons building. Please be careful around construction areas. We have locks on the Picnic Shelter and are working on a schedule for locking. If you need access during business hours, please get a key from City Hall. We will be replacing the broken heaters in the Civic Meeting room and City Hall with more efficient ductless heat pumps. Public Works has been filling the cracks in the 501 Building.

Why does Yachats have a water shortage? Yachats gets its water from two small streams, Reedy and Salmon Creeks. These creeks have relatively small watersheds compared to other coastal cities. The Yachats watersheds provide some of the highest quality and best tasting water that you can find. But when we have droughts, they dwindle down to very low flows. This is not a new problem for Yachats, as each summer we teeter-totter on having a water restriction and the last few years have been very dry.

The City of Yachats has been very proactive on this issue. We have an inter-governmental agreement with Southwest Lincoln Water District, which means we can purchase their water or sell our water to them in times of need to keep up with water demands. Southwest Lincoln Water District has an inter-governmental agreement with the City of Waldport. So, in effect, Yachats, Southwest Lincoln Water District and Waldport are all in this together when it comes to supplying water.

Some of the other things Yachats has been doing to mitigate the effects of drought is to invest in its infrastructure. Fixing and replacing leaky pipes, building treated water storage reservoirs, and making long term plans for raw water storage impoundments.

Water infrastructure is expensive. The new 250,000-gallon reservoir on the south side of the bridge is costing \$1.7 million. The reservoir should be active within a month, just in time to help with water demands.

Going into Phase 1 water conservation is a good thing as it shows the need for conservation and opens the door to grants and low interest loans from the state and federal governments to build more infrastructure.

Water Restrictions in Effect

Due to the lack of precipitation it is necessary that the City of Yachats enter Phase 1 of our Water Conservation Actions. A prolonged drought may result in additional restrictions.

Every Drop Counts

It may be necessary for the City to purchase water from another provider. If that happens a service charge will be added to the current water rate to cover the added expense.

For more information about the emergency regulations please see the Yachats Municipal Code, Chapter 8.22

Phase 1 Requirements

1. The watering of lawns, gardens and landscaping is restricted to alternative days. Specifically, houses with an address number ending in even numbers (0-2-4-6-8) shall water lawns only on even numbered calendar days. Houses with an address number ending in odd numbers (1-3-5-7-9), or fractional addresses, shall water only on odd numbered calendar days. All watering of lawns, gardens and landscaping shall be prohibited between the hours of 10:00 am and 7:00 pm of each day.
2. All sales of water to persons who are not customers of the water system are prohibited.
3. No water shall be used by the Yachats Rural Fire District for drills, fire hose testing, hydrant flushing or truck washing.
4. The operation of an ornamental fountain, unless it is equipped with a recirculation system, is prohibited.

Burn Ban and Outdoor Fire Permits

A full burn ban is in effect for the Yachats area. The State has issued a closure of all open fire on beaches. Lincoln County has a temporary ban on open flame pits and the outdoor

burning of all wood and charcoal, including wood and charcoal grills. If your grill does not have a valve to turn off the flame, you should not use it.

The Yachats Fire Department reminds that permits are required for using back yard fire pits and cooking over an open flame (when ban is not in effect). It is very important that Yachats Fire has an up to date list of permits so we can monitor proper clearances and be able to notify permit holders of closures. There is no charge for the permits and they can be renewed over the phone by calling 541-547-3266.

People read for a variety of reasons. Sometimes to escape into a fantasy world; to learn about a particular person or place, to learn about a period in history, to gain insight or understanding and dozens of other reasons. Reading can validate our feelings or ideas, and can help us understand others views, experiences, ideas, motivations or beliefs.

Most would agree that our country is under

terrible strain at this moment in history. We are so polarized in our politics, it almost seems like there are two Americas, with radically different beliefs and values. Some actually predict a civil war. If there has ever been a time to try understand each other, it is now.

Two books I read recently opened wide a window into two communities that seem almost foreign to me. One a "hillbilly" culture in southern Ohio/Rural Kentucky and one a General Motors factory town struggling to maintain its identity and culture as the largest GM factory closes. Robert D. Putnam writes "Reflecting on the state of the white working class, J.D. Vance's, *Hillbilly Elegy* focus on cultural decay and the individual, whereas Amy Goldstein's *Janesville* emphasizes the economic collapse and the community. To understand how we have gotten to America's current malaise, both are essential reading."

JD Vance, a self described "hillbilly" who is also a former marine and graduate of Yale Law School, tells his personal story of growing up in a poor white "hillbilly" family who moved to southern Ohio from Kentucky's Appalachia region in the hopes of escaping the generations of poverty, alcoholism, abuse, so prevalent in the region. The New York Times declares the book is "a passionate analysis of a culture in crisis—white working class. The decline of this group, a demographic of our country that has been slowly disintegrating over forty years ... never before written about as searingly from the inside."

Janesville, Wisconsin, the hometown of Paul Ryan, was the home of the largest GM plant in the country for over 80 years. It had more than seven thousand workers in its heyday and led to thousands of jobs at nearby companies that supplied parts. The town revolved around the factory. The Company and the United Autoworkers Union provided far more than jobs; they were the forces that drove the engine of white middle class life style that prevailed in this community for decades. This book tells the story of the closure of the plant and the impact the closure had on individuals, and the struggle redefine their community.

It is the story of hard working middle class union

families, who through no fault of their own, gradually slide into poverty as they lost their jobs, houses, and self respect.

Today there is a new normal in Janesville. Unemployment is low-just four percent-but the jobs that are available don't pay well (about half of the GM wages), and the standard of living has declined. Thousands of families have fallen into working poverty as many work two or more jobs. Socially, there is a void where factories and unions once created a sense of common life. Many of the traditions such as Christmas food drives, parades and summer festivals sponsored by the Union, have disappeared. And the citizens of Janesville? They set out to reinvent their town and themselves. Over a few years, it became evident that no one outside-not the Democrats or the Republicans, not the bureaucrats in Madison or in Washington, not the fading unions had the key to create the middle class anew. In the end, in someway it is a success story. The town did survive; new industries, such as the Dollar General distribution center, came to town. But life is different now- less secure and certainly less "affluent."

These books gave me a glimpse into lives and communities very different than my own. They provided insight into the root cause of the frustration, anger and sense of abandonment as promise after promise by the government were not kept.

But the story of J.D.Vance and his story of overcoming seemingly insurmountable obstacles to better his life and the generosity and ingenuity of Janesville citizens who reinvented their community, provides hope and optimism that the country will survive these difficult times.

Yachats to Florence Bus Service Update

John Ahlen, Lane County Transit District Accessible Services Specialist, provided the following update:

We've just completed two major milestones for getting started. We've finished our RFP's for a service provider and for our vehicle manufacturer. We had four bids for each competitive process, and had an evaluation team rank and score

proposals based on established service criteria. Schetky was selected as our manufacturer for a 25' El Dorado Aerotech, which is in the process of being built. The vehicle is part of a 9-vehicle lot we are purchasing for our rural and paratransit fleets, and we have requested that the Florence/Yachats bus in particular be prioritized as the first vehicle to roll out of the factory. I recently spoke with the manufacturer, and while there currently is not an ETA on completion we are making preparations to be ready for when it arrives.

We also selected River Cities Taxi as our service provider for the duration of the pilot project. We'll gain some efficiencies by having a provider who is already familiar with the route and operates one of the connecting services. If the service is shown to be viable and continues into the future, there would need to be another process to select a long-term provider. I've already connected Josh at River Cities with our service planners to work on establishing the timetable for the route. We continue to collect feedback through our online survey and directly through phone and e-mail.

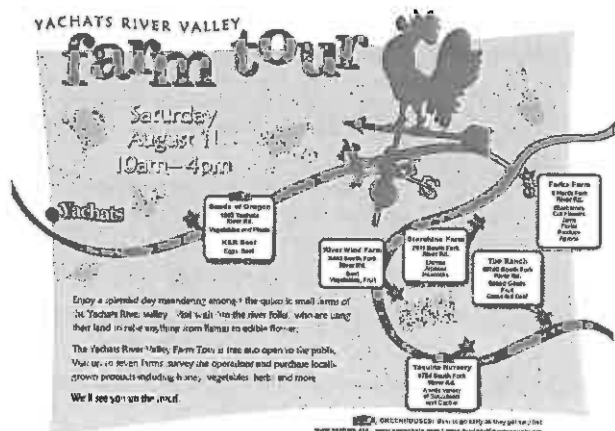
2nd Street Garden Open House

Library Move Update

At their July 10, 2018 meeting, the Library Commission discussed an estimate for remodeling the 501 building for library use. The estimate was based on plans prepared by the 2+2 Working Group for moving the Library. The estimate reflected industry standard costs of \$150 per square foot in labor and materials, plus 20% for permits, design, and other work. It totaled between \$750,000 and \$1,000,000, depending on the final plans.

Since this estimate exceeded the amounts discussed by the 2+2 group, the Commission determined that prudence required further deliberations. Subsequently, discussions were held with the library volunteers, the Friends of the Library, and other stakeholders in anticipation of the Commission meeting.

At their meeting, the Commission decided to recommend to the City Council that the 2+2 group be reconvened to explore two options:

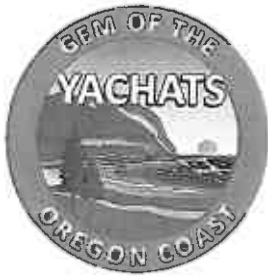
- Modify the plans generated by the 2+2 group and reassess our expectations.
- Refocus the efforts of the stakeholders on expanding the current facility.

The City Council approved the Commission's recommendation at their July 11, 2018 meeting, and the reformed 2+2 group met on July 17, 2018. They have a target date of September for reporting the results of their work to the Commission who will subsequently take a recommendation to the City Council.
