Weed Abatement Deadline July 1



The deadline to cut back weeds is July 1. According to our code, brush should be cut back to no more than six (6) inches.

Yachats Municipal Code 508.110(H)

No owner or person in charge of property shall allow the uncontrolled growth and accumulation of dead or dormant weeds, brush, high grass, scotch broom, gorse, blackberries or pampas grass to become a fire hazard.

Such vegetation shall be removed or eliminated before July 1st of each year, or at any time the City Council declares a period of extreme fire danger, by cutting to a height of no more than six (6) inches and mulching all cut materials. If any owner or person in charge of property does not comply with this subsection, the City may contract with a firm licensed to do business within the City limits to bring the property into compliance as provided in Section 5.08.250, Summary abatement. The City may recover all costs as provided in Section 5.08.240, Assessment of costs.

We continue to work to resolve the flooring issues in the multipurpose room. I look forward to seeing you in the Commons as our schedule of events gears up for summer!

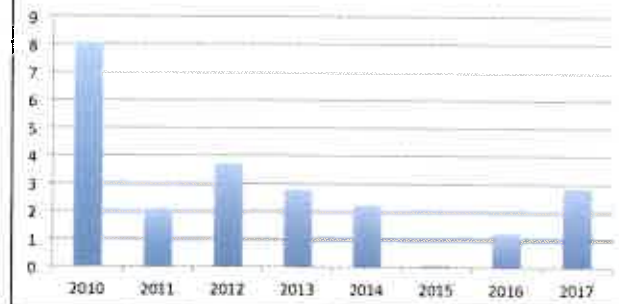

Just a reminder...

The annual utility rate increases based on the Construction Cost Index were established three years ago. The next increase will appear on your August 2018 bill, for July usage. The rate is increasing 3.3%, according to the CCI. For households, that means a monthly **base** rate increase of \$2.98 – from \$89.71 to \$92.69 for the first 1,496 gallons (2 units).

Proposed Green Waste Curbside Pickup

At the May City Council meeting, representatives from Dahl Disposal Service presented to the Council their annual plan for services and rates. Each year, Dahl shows their financials and reviews rates as part of their franchise agreement with the City. This year, Dahl requested an 11% increase in their monthly fee for residential garbage and recycling pickup. For the majority of users, the requested increase would raise the rate from \$27.80 to \$30.85 per month for a 35-gallon bin

with weekly pickup. Many of you may have read about China's decision to no longer accept recyclables and the significant impact that has had on costs. Dahl reported they previously earned \$25 per ton for recyclables, and they now must pay \$108 per ton to dispose of it. The Council approved this rate change, effective July 1, 2018.



In light of reductions in accepted recycling materials and of customer desire for green waste curbside pickup, Dahl proposed a change in services where they would pick up recycling every other week and pick up green waste on the weeks with no recycling. Invasive species

could also be placed in the green waste bin, which would be provided by Dahl. The green waste program would cost an additional \$1.75 per month, to be applied to all Dahl customer accounts. The City Council must approve this service should residents decide they want it. Dahl currently charges \$26 per load of green waste, while the annual cost of the curbside program would be \$21. Dahl has a pilot program charging \$96 per year (\$8 per month) for an annual for green waste pickup (every other Monday). Dahl does not currently know how long they will continue this pilot program.

The Council is asking for input on the green waste curbside pickup proposal. You may email your position to cityhall@yachatsmail.org or come to the June 13 Council meeting at 6:00 pm to speak in person. Waldport has already approved this program.

Clean Sweep Dates June 15-17

Your Public Works & Streets Commission is once again sponsoring the annual "Clean Sweep". It will be from Friday, June 15, through Sunday afternoon June 17.

For those of you new to Yachats, it's your time to get rid of unwanted items around the house that you no longer need or want – and since one man's trash is another man's treasure, there's a good chance that someone else will pick up and use your discarded item and put it back into use.

Just bring your unwanted items to the street between the 501 Building and the ballfield, and volunteers will be there to assist you with unloading. According to Dahl, we will have containers for brush, metal, electronics, and trash. We will also have a container for batteries and light bulbs.



We can accept paint only if the label is readable and the paint is inside and sealed tight. If you can't read the label, the paint must be dried out and thrown in the trash. Glass will go in the trash.

Feel free to browse the discarded items during the weekend, and you can adopt any of them for free.

You are welcomed to put your items out on the curb in front of your house starting Wednesday, June 13, and drive around town looking for treasures. If items are not picked up by Friday, please bring to the Clean Sweep area behind the 501 Building.

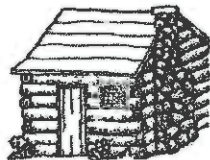

Yachats Pollinator Corridor Needs Plants and People

Did you know that 75% of flowering plants rely on bees and butterflies for reproduction, and 35% of the world food crop production depends on these pollinators? In the face of habitat loss, bee and butterfly populations are in decline worldwide. Yachats has been designated a Pollination Corridor by ODOT. A corridor is the connecting place to larger patches of habitat. To make our corridor work for bees and butterflies, native plants and pollinating perennials will be planted in the island

If you receive this newsletter before June 2, you still have a chance to participate in National Trails Day! All are welcome to join the day's collaborative stewardship project working on the St. Perpetua Trail as well as a potluck lunch. You can find details at www.yachatstrails.org.

The Trails Committee (Including YIPSI!) has been busy the last several months planning and prioritizing both current and future opportunities. High on the list is the new, permanent bridge spanning Amanda Creek. Since the original bridge was washed away in 2015, various options have been explored and discussed. Recently, with FEMA funds still available, the Oregon Parks and Recreation Department (OPRD) made a decision to go with its initial plan for an 80-foot bridge on the existing easement. OPRD will bring in its own crew to do the work and we look forward to seeing progress on the plan.

There is high interest in improvements to the 804 Trail South, particularly between the Underground and the old Landmark building. We want to make it safer for pedestrians and to fill the 60-meter gap in the Oregon Coast Trail. Trails Committee members are documenting their ideas and vision for discussion at the June City Council work session.

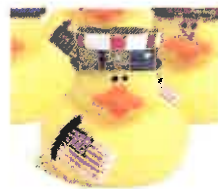
Yachats’ 23rd Independence Day is full of wacky, whimsical, people-powered fun (there are no motorized floats in this parade).
